I have seen Angie McMonigal's work before but never had a deeper look. https://angiemcmonigal.com


Jennifer Renwick is another whose work I had browsed and passed over but when I had a deeper look I fell in love with m any of her images.

The Lens Ladies: Judy Thistleton Martin, Robyn Cook & Jeannie McInnes. Most of this recent work from these three ladies does not immediately look like photography. All have been involved in many photography shows over the years. They have a lot of experience in photographic practices and are known for their experimentation and creativity. Whilst the images are unlike traditional photography nevertheless this new body of work has been inspired by photography as they "look through a different lens". And different they certainly are: the work by Judy is mixed media, Robyn's is largely photographic montage and 3D while Jeannie's is based around printmaking. 

PHOTOGRAPHER FOR THE MONTH OF MAY: ROBIN MURRAY


These photos were taken in Deanii Forest where I found that Redeye and Razor Grinder cicadas were flying into a small group of trees and congregating within camera reach. The trees had such an interesting texture that I thought I would use this opportunity to photograph Cicadas.

I take my photos with my Canon EOS 600D. I use this with a Cannon 100mm macro lens.

I also use a macro twin lite Mt-24EX twin flash to help with lighting and depth of focus. Often everything happens so quickly that I set the shutter speed and the ISO so that I can keep up with what is happening. A reasonable depth of focus for me is the hardest battle.

For these photos I used an ISO of 400 and a shutter speed of 1/200 sec with flash. If I have the luxury of a relatively still subject, I set the F stop to about 10 and hope for a better depth of focus.

I use the opportunities as they come.

STORING IMAGES BY DAVID THOMAS

Quick description of my gear as follows:

Asus E6550 V desktop, Intel Core i7, 24 Gb DDR3 RAM, 2 TB SATA HDD Dell UP2716D 27 inch monitor Acer X223 22.5 inch monitor (if I want to run dual screens) Canon MG8250 A4 all in one printer Canon Pro-1000 A2 printer Wacom Intuos 6 inch pen tablet WD My Book Duo 12 TB RAID disk (configured as RAID 0) WD Elements 8 TB external HDD 2 x WD Passport 4 TB external HDD's Sony Viao Pro 11 laptop, Intel Core i5, 4 Gb RAM, 128 Gb SD HDD, 128 Gb external card

The laptop in the picture is actually my work laptop and the Acer screen is running dual screen with it.

My backup strategy works roughly like this:

High availability data on desktop HDD, backed up real time (automated) to RAID disk and weekly (automated) to RAID disk

Photos originals on RAID disk, backed up weekly (automated) to External HDD System, backed up weekly (automated) to RAID Disk

Automatic replication of high availability data done real time (automated) between desktop and laptop

Periodic backup (manually initiated) of original photos and all data to 4 TB Passport drives, one kept onsite, one offsite

Acronis periodic backups done as incrementals with a full backup each 5 runs

Main Software I use is the following:

Free File Synch (data synch to laptop and manual backups to passport drives)

McAfee Total Protection (including VPN and Password Manager)

Photoshop, Adobe Camera Raw, Adobe Bridge (Creative Cloud)
