EXHIBITION REVIEWED

Feathered Passions [Graham Cam & Steve Tredinnick].

Graham's photos capture birds from Australia to the Antarctic and Costa Rica. The hummingbirds would have been particularly difficult to capture because of their small size and speed. What is particularly interesting is that Graham managed to capture some of the characteristics of the different bird species in their environments. You can continue to see Graham's exceptional work by attending the Blue Mountains Photography Group's future exhibitions (either live on display or digitally via Zoom). Steve's watercolours captured birds of the Blue Mountains. He is obviously an accomplished watercolourist which is a difficult medium but the titles for the works tell the story of these bird portraits. Overall this was a beautiful exhibition that showed

the 'punch' of colour that photography brought while the watercolours were more subdued in colour and quite atmospheric. The two mediums complemented each other well. What is Fine Art Photography?

I begin by clarifying that fine art photography does indeed have objective criteria despite falling in the subjective and vast realm of art.

The principal and underlying criteria that distinguishes fine art photography from other fields in photography is that fine art photography is not about digitally recording a subject. Using a camera to document

what exactly appears in front of the photographer usually falls in the category of photo-journalism and is frequently found in publications that feature purist images taken with a camera to record the scene as it exactly existed at a precise moment in time.

Fine art photography, on the other hand, is first and foremost about the artist. It is not about capturing what the camera sees; it is about capturing what the artist sees. In fine art photography, therefore, the artist uses the camera as one more tool to create a work of art. The camera is used to make an art piece that reveals the vision of the artist and makes a statement of that vision rather than documenting the subject before the lens.

For example, Georgia O'Keeffe's famous desert paintings are an expression of her vision of the New Mexico landscape; on the other hand, if a dozen photographers with tripods set their settings to the required exposure after light-metering and took an image of the landscape next to Mrs. O'Keeffe's easel, the results would be images that would have recorded the scene but not have presented the artistic statement required of a fine art photograph. Hence, a fine art photograph must contain elements of control similar to the controls Mrs. O'Keeffe and all artists use in making an art piece. Ansel Adams' expressed it best in the quote below:

Art implies control of reality, for reality itself possesses no sense of the aesthetic. Photography becomes art when certain controls are applied.

So, a fine art photograph must go beyond the literal representation of a scene or subject. It must deeply express the feelings and vision of the photographer and clearly reveal that it was created by an artist and not by just the camera. It must be clear that it involved an original, deliberate creation and that every aspect of making the photograph in the field and in the photographer's post-processing digital

studio, including the printing, are an individual expression from within the artist.

DID YOU KNOW?

- 1. The word "Photography" comes from the Greek, meaning to draw with light. The earliest known use of the word photograph as we know it was in 1839 by the astronomer Sir John Herschel.
- 2. The chemicals used in the development of photographs included mercury, silver nitrate, lye, and more. These chemicals were extremely dangerous and many photographers had to take time off from their work due to illness caused by exposure to the chemicals. Over time, prolonged contact with these chemicals and metals could lead to madness or even death. Photography before the digital age was serious, potentially life-threatening business!
- 3. Before the take-over of digital cameras, the US government was covertly taking pictures of the Soviet Union. To achieve this they launched 20 satellites, which each contained around 60 miles of film along with their camera. When the film was used, it was jettisoned from the satellite and fell back to Earth.
- 4. One of the most famous images of the 20th century, the "Afghan Girl" was taken in 1984 and published in National Geographic in 1985. However, the girl in the image didn't know it became world famous until she was shown her own photo in 2002.
